READ

Inspiring Bellingham to read, view, and listen:

The Library Board of Trustees eliminated a barrier to children's library access and encouraged more family use of library resources by eliminating fines on children's/teen materials on children's cards.

Library Card Campaign, "The Smartest Card": staff reached out to all schools, including our academic library partners: we had a 40% increase in cards issued

Sept 2013 over Sept 2012; staff attended fourteen school events during the fall campaign.

Bellingham Public Library is a major participant. and the Friends of the Library are a primary funder, of Whatcom READS! 2013's visiting author was David Guterson, featuring his book, **Snow Falling on** Cedars.

Library staff started two new library-based **book** clubs, one for teens and one for adults; staff also began **book talking** in schools and retirement centers.



LEARN

Promoting Lifelong Learning from birth through adulthood:

The Early Learning Center at Central Library opened with fresh paint, new carpet, and an abundance of educational toys and learning activities. The library also received grant funding for, and created an Early Learning Space at the Fairhaven Branch Library.

Youth Services staff began a "Builders Club" to promote open, creative play for children ages 4-12 and families.

Legos, duplos, wooden blocks and other building materials are available to inspire young builders.

We implemented **Baby** Time, adding to the eleven already popular (and filled-to-capacity) story time classes for preschoolers; staff models songs, rhymes, movement, and stories for non-walking babies and their adults.

The Library was awarded a \$15,000 grant from Paul G. Allen Family Foundation to reimagine our library space; staff began planning in 2013 and will implement the "SkillShare" space in 2014.

Staff vacancies were filled with people who have expertise to directly address the library's strategic directions in **Early Childhood Development/Early** Literacy, and Readers' Advisory.

MEET

Creating thriving spaces where the community connects, accesses library resources, and shares their stories:

The Library's budget request was supported to restore Sunday hours in 2014, improving public access to library services. Planning for reopening began in 2013 and included increasing staff resources to serve the public.

Library Now, a mobile app to access
Bellingham Public Library resources was introduced to the community. With the mobile app you can check your account, find out if the library owns a title, and place holds with just a few clicks!

Facilities were improved to provide more inviting and contemporary environments: the exterior of Central Library was painted; and furnishings and access to technology were improved at Fairhaven using funding from the Winifred Wilks bequest.

DISCOVER

Providing library collections that introduce ideas, build skills, support lifelong learning, and spark creativity:

The Library's books and other materials budget grew by \$25,000 for 2013 to continue diversifying materials formats, including eBooks; an increase was also supported by City Council for 2014. One of the library's strategic goals is to restore the significant cutbacks

sustained by the library materials budget in recent years.

Zinio online magazine service was added for the community, providing free online access to 100 titles.

Library staff provided valuable expertise to the

Whatcom Museum, and the community has greater access as a result to the Morse Reference Library of art books housed in the Lightcatcher Building; materials are now visible through the library's online catalog.
